PESEL number

PESEL (Universal Electronic System for Registration of the Population) is a unique 11-digit national identification number in Poland. It is essential for various formalities like tax settlements, opening a bank account or setting up a Trusted Profile. Obtaining a PESEL is free and valid indefinitely.

Keep your PESEL number secure and only share it with trusted individuals.



Bank account:

Why is it worth having a bank account with a branch in Poland?

Having a bank account in a Polish bank can be crucial for legalising your stay and is important from the perspective of the Doctoral School – this is where your doctoral scholarship will be transferred. Additionally, you can avoid unnecessary currency conversion fees that might occur with foreign accounts.

What should you know about opening a bank account?

Offers and requirements vary depending on the bank, but most commonly, you will need:

- An ID document (ID card or passport)
- A valid residence document (visa or temporary residence card)
- A university certificate confirming student status
- A PESEL number

Each bank may have additional requirements, so it's always recommended to check the details directly with the bank.



Transportation discounts for PhD students

As a PhD student in Poland, you're eligible for 51% transportation discounts on public transport up to the age of 35. To take advantage of these discounts, simply present your doctoral ID card when purchasing tickets or passes. Please remember to have the doctoral ID with you whenever travelling. You may also obtain a monthly ticket on your PhD student ID by uploading the ticket in the ticket machines available inside the metro, buses, trams, and public spaces near the stops.

Health insurance

Health insurance is required in Poland for medical purposes and to legalize your stay.

If you:

- · have Polish origins,
- have an employment contract with the University of Warsaw (UW) or another employer,

you will be insured by the UW or your employer under the public insurance system (NFZ).

- If you have an EHIC, you can use the public health service (NFZ) free of charge in cases of illness (cold, flu etc.) or accident.
- If you do not meet the above conditions, you should self-insure with the public or private insurance.

Legalisation of stay - Welcome Point:

To continue your studies, it's important that you stay in Poland legally. Remember to apply for a temporary residence card (TRC) before your current residence document (visa/visa-free stay/residence card issued by another Schengen country) expires. The type of residence permit depends on several factors such as purpose of stay.

Accommodation



University Dormitories

The University of Warsaw provides 2722 places in seven dormitories across the city. Each dormitory features a quiet study room, TV room, computer room, and laundry facilities. Monthly rent ranges from EUR 115 to 210 (PLN 480-950) per person, depending on the room type. Applications are submitted via the USOSweb system.



Apply early, as applications are processed on a first-come, first-served basis. Deadlines vary annually, so stay informed through official announcements.

PhD students can also apply for accommodation at the Hera Hotel or the House of a Scientific Worker, offering single, twin, and triple rooms. Due to limited availability, booking depends on room availability.
